Jamie Murdoch's story was further amplified by the fact that he had been stranded in freezing conditions on Mont Blanc in 1999 and had his limbs amputated because of frostbite.

Recently on a lochside walk we were surprised to notice two empty wheelchairs parked on a pontoon. A few minutes later kayaks came into view and two disabled sportsmen aboard came alongside and were helped ashore.

I have become so much more aware of the difficulties that tetraplegics face from day to day as I am now an avid reader of Melanie Reid's 'Spinal Column,' which is featured in "The Times" every Saturday. Melanie is tetraplegic after breaking her back in a riding accident in 2000. She has limited mobility, rotting toe nails, clawed feet and persistent bladder infections. Her self- deprecation and wry humour put all my moans into perspective.

All of these and the many others who have chosen to compete in the Paralympic games are an inspiration to us all in the way that they have shown a desire to overcome the handicaps which life has thrown them.

It was heart- warming to find out that the International Paralympic Committee took a hard line on drug cheating in an effort to counteract those who put the health and lives of competitors at further risk.

given by Jesus does not really make it any easier for weak humanity. When asked by Peter, as recorded by Matthew, should forgiveness be given seven times, Jesus replies 'seventy times seven'. Jesus did not tell us following him would be easy!

Yet consider his own example, as he hung in agony on the cross, his prayer to his Heavenly Father was,

'Father, forgive these people, for they don't know what they are doing.' Luke 23, verse 34

Fortunately, I have not had to face any of these terrible circumstances and have not been put to that particular test. I can only offer prayer that God would strengthen me and that he would guide the hearts of violent people towards paths of peace.

As usual out syllabus has a good variety of subjects:- interesting talks; charities to support; films to see; projects to find out more about; visits;


concerts; a party; meetings arranged by Ardrossan Presbyterial Council and our own Christmas and Easter Services.

When asked for the secret to such a long and happy marriage, Frank, in his usual chirpy manner replied that "it was the learning of two words - Yes Dear!" We all know that it is their enduring love for each other. We offer them our congratulations and very best wishes for the future.


Fabric Committee Report

There was a great turn out on the day and thankfully the rain held off and we even had a blink of sun. This event also provided the opportunity for children to register for the Kid's Club to be held during the week to come.

Well over 50 children arrived on the Monday morning for the Kid's Club, called Pyramid Rock this year, and we must have been doing something right for our numbers kept up throughout the four days. We

had an excellent group of young teenage helpers as well as adult helpers from all three congregations. There was a variety of activities, stories, games and wonderful songs, the words and tunes of which kept buzzing through my head all the week. These different activities reinforced the text each day and it's to be hoped that these little examples of faith will be remembered and will develop within the children as they grow older. Each day ended with a light lunch, which the children really enjoyed.

On the Tuesday and Thursday of the week we held two youth evenings and again we were greatly encouraged when well over 20 young people attended each evening along with at least ten youth helpers together with the adult helpers from the three churches. There was a brilliant atmosphere while the children took part in a variety of challenges, games and talks, and each night finished with supper- pizzas on the Tuesday and K.F. Chicken on the Thursday- yes, K.F.C. has arrived in Stevenston!

To finish off our mission week we held a Prayer Walk on Sunday 31st. This started off at St John's Church where we sang 'Stand up stand up for Jesus' and Father Martin Poland led us in prayer. Our next stop was at Stevenston Cross where we sang, 'Lord the light of your love is shining' and this time Rev. Scott Cameron led the prayer. At Livingstone the door of the church magically opened up as we arrived and just as well as it had begun to rain at this point. Here we sang, 'To God be the glory,' with Rev. Robert Travers leading the prayer.

We all then made our way to Ardeer Church for afternoon tea. Despite the weather we were pleased with the turn out (more than last year) and it was great to see a good number of our own congregation joining in the walk too.

This year's Mission was a great success but that would not have been possible without all the adult cooperation and help. We would like to thank all those who delivered the leaflets, came for lunch on the first Sunday, assisted at the fun day and took part in the Prayer Walk, and an extra special thanks to the 'Livingstone Team' who helped at the Kid's Club and supported us so willingly throughout the whole week.

Shoebox Appeal 2016



A big thank you to everybody who contributed in any way to the Shoe Box Appeal in 2015. Blythswood Care gathered and distributed 116,576 shoeboxes. This was approximately 10% more than 2014.

The shoeboxes received last year were distributed in Albania, Bulgaria, Hungary, Kosovo, Moldova, Pakistan, Romania, Serbia and Ukraine.

It was a good result but Blythswood believe that with your support they can do better in this 50th. Anniversary Year. They would like to increase the number of boxes distributed by at least 30,000.

Blythswood started life in 1966 as the Blythswood Tract Society, providing practical and spiritual help to those on the streets of Glasgow at that time.

Fifty years on, spreading the gospel by the printed page remains central to the work of Blythswood Care.


They would like to include the Gospel According to John with every shoebox sent to Eastern Europe in 2016. They estimate that 150,000 copies in six languages will cost £60,000.

Kiwi Flying Visit



On our way from Australia to South America, we had the opportunity to spend a few days in New Zealand. As it is probably our younger daughter's favourite place in the world, this particular stopover was not optional. But it was another first for us, so we were looking forward to it. We stayed in Auckland which is at the north end of North Island, so that's where the weather should have been best. Unfortunately, only the Scots could go to the other side of the world to find a climate no better than the one they had left. More of that later. Auckland's nickname is

the "City of Sails". New Zealand has had its share of financial issues, and the country's biggest city was a bit run down. We renamed it the "City of Sales". Much refurbishment was going on, motorways were being constructed or repaired, and finding our way around was difficult and frustrating. Around the harbour things were further advanced, in a beautiful setting, but we still only saw four sails, and three of them were on the same boat.

On the way to collect a hire car, we walked past the Rainbow Warrior Memorial, marking the sinking of the Greenpeace ship on the 10th July 1985 in Auckland Harbour by French Government agents. Greenpeace later said "you can't sink a rainbow".

We had a couple of trips in the short time we were there. The first was to Rotorua, one of the most active volcanic areas on the planet. The geysers, the bubbling mud pools, and the smells are unforgettable. Shane, the Maori guide who showed us around, regaled us with anecdotes, and Anne serenaded us on the way home with Pokarekare Ana, a Maori song from her Girl Guide days. Our second trip was to the Coromandel Peninsula, an area noted for its scenery. It was very like Scotland. We couldn't see much of it for the mist and rain. Served us right for going on St Patrick's day. Where the downpour eased and the mist cleared (both temporary occurrences), the views were sensational, as were the sheer drops off the sides of the narrow mountain roads. The driver was frequently reminded to look at the road, not the mountains.

We will now be in trouble from the aforementioned younger daughter for being so hard on her favourite country, but actually we enjoyed it hugely, met some lovely people from many different countries, and had some good meals. One of these was in Rotorua, where the staff were Chilean, the chef's fiancée was Filipina, the restaurant was called Che, and the chef and owner was from Argentina, which just happened to be our next stop.
