Welcome to the June edition and for once the sun is shining and has been for several weeks. We have used the good weather to get some much needed tidying up in the garden done and to plant our summer annuals.

Recently, mainly because of the good weather, we decided to make a return visit to Dumfries House Estate. In the few years since we were last there the Queen Elizabeth Garden has been transformed from a largely uninteresting site to a wonderfully restored garden with a mixture of terraces, new greenhouses, formal areas and everywhere there are flowers in a myriad of colours. It now costs £3 to visit the gardens but if you go to the Visitor Centre to pay, at the end of your visit, you are rewarded for your honesty by receiving a ticket which will allow entrance to the garden for a year. Another new area which impressed us was the Harmony outdoor play park which is close to the engineering workshop. A theme which focuses on the natural elements, earth, water, air and fire, is incorporated into a landscape design which uses high quality engineering play equipment to teach a bit about engineering in a fun way. I pedalled on a static bicycle and produced a couple of fairly high water jets —magic. We had a great time and I noticed there was even a three year old experimenting and enjoying himself too.

There is a new maze which was opened in 2016 and already the trees were tall enough for us to get lost in it. The maze which also includes obelisks and a Japanese pagoda was the idea of Prince Charles, inspired by the one at Sandringham and his childhood visits there. I hope some of you will have the opportunity to visit Dumfries House Estate in the near future. It is definitely worthwhile.

Prayer Thoughts



Our church is about to enter a period of change with the arrival of our new minister, the Rev Dave Sutherland. In the workplace, one of the key pillars of good practice is the management of change. Many of us will have attended courses which focus on how to deal with change. How then should we respond to change in the church, is it the same as any other organisation? As with many such questions the answer is yes and no. Members of the congregation may change, elders may change, ministers may change, but we are reminded in the letter to the Hebrews that the church has at its head a constant. In the letter to the Hebrews chapter 13 at verse 8 the writer reminds us;

"Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today and forever"

We are constantly prayerfully seeking ways to ensure that we keep building Christ's church. As we get older we may sometimes resist the changes we experience, we get comfortable with the pattern we are used to. There are times when we should challenge ourselves to see if the words 'comfortable' and 'Christian' really belong together. Instead of resisting, we should ask in prayer if we are following the path that Christ our leader wants us to be on. As we enter this new ministry we must pray for Dave Sutherland as he seeks to keep building Christ's church in Stevenston, and give thanks for the work done by David Hebenton and those who came before.

Confession: Bring before God the times that word deed and thought have made you uncomfortable and ask God's forgiveness where this has left His work undone.

- IT in worship give thanks for the work done to enable the new system to be installed and the ongoing work of operating the system, service by service.
- Easter give thanks for the services held during Holy Week to remind us of the real meaning of Easter.

- Ministry pray for Rev. Dave Sutherland as he begins his ministry with us.
- Schools pray for those pupils who are in transition from primary to secondary or who have arrived at the end of their time at secondary.
- Summer Mission pray that the mission will build on the success of previous years and bring the Gospel to more people, young and old in Stevenston.
- The World Pray for those countries and communities affected by war and famine, grant them a safe and healthy environment to live in.
- Prayer pray that talking to God will remain a key part of our daily lives.

Presbytery Report May 2017



After the opening devotions the Presbytery welcomed members of the Guild Presbyterial Council. The council's annual report was delivered by Moira Buchanan. She began with a short video entitled, 'The Guild Today,' which illustrated the wide range of activities the present day members, men and woman, are involved in. The Guild is in its 130th year in 2017. Moira then gave a brief summary of the projects the Guild is involved with.

This is the second year of their 'Be Bold Be Strong' initiative. Last year's theme was 'Go in Peace' and this year it was 'Go in Joy'. She highlighted the six main projects the Guild is supporting and to date has raised £40256 for them. This is an increase compared to last year.

The main business of Presbytery was pretty mundane. The highlight for Livingstone was the call to Presbytery to attend the induction of the Rev. Dave Sutherland at Ardeer, Rev James McNay to preside, Isobel Beck DCS to conduct, and Rev Lily McKinnon to give the sermon and deliver the charges.

Mission and Discipleship Council have produced a short video on the work of the Disability Working Group which was shown. The Council would like one member from each congregation to act as a contact person for the group to help disseminate information to congregations.

Property: Ardeer have decided to use some of their funds in Edinburgh to complete their restoration programme.

Mission: Rev. David Watson reported on the group trip to Milala Presbytery in Malawi. He enthused at the reception they received and the generosity of their hosts. The group intend to prepare a presentation about their visit and what the next steps should be. Here are some points from the congregation he visited. On the Sunday he preached, the first service started at 7.30 and finished at 10.00. The second service started at 10.30 and finished at 1.00 with standing room only, followed by Sunday School (500 attended) and the youth organisations. The local minister's wife is a primary 1 teacher in the school that meets in the church grounds. When asked, she said she had 190 pupils in her class. Malawi is primarily a young country demographically. Presbytery is now looking to congregations to come forward and be willing to be twinned with one of the fourteen congregations in Milala Presbytery.

The presentation to Kirk Sessions, on the Role of Presbytery is ready to go forward and will be given to three Kirk Sessions in September. It is hoped that all Kirk Sessions will see it in the next two years.

Presbytery closed with the Benediction

The Mission Committee afterward spent most time further discussing the Malawi visit and how the presentation should be developed.

Visual System



Around 18 months ago, a small committee was formed by the Kirk Session tasked with researching the feasibility of installing a visual system within the Sanctuary. Many churches now use projectors and televisions as part of worship as they offer more versatility than traditional hymn books or printed sheets. After visiting various Churches who already have similar systems installed, the committee sought advice from local audio visual companies. Our main aim was to ensure that there was minimal change to the overall look of the Sanctuary whilst trying to ensure that everyone would be able to see a screen.

We also needed to choose whether we would be installing televisions, projectors or a combination of both. It was decided that the two main screens should be projectors as you can achieve a larger viewing area than televisions. Unlike other churches who project on to screens, our walls are of a neutral colour and in good enough condition to project directly on to them. This means that when the projectors are turned off, the look of the Sanctuary is the same as it was before the installation.

The new system was fully installed in March after the Kirk Session, Ardrossan Presbytery and CARTA (Church Art and Architecture Committee) agreed to the project. There are 2 large projections on to the walls next to the organ pipes and two smaller televisions on the balcony. The system can be operated from three areas — one upstairs,

one downstairs and one at the organ next to the communion table. The new system will create opportunities to enhance Sunday worship. The words of the hymns and Bible readings are viewable along with intimations, photographs, videos and much more.

There have been some concerns regarding the phasing out of the current printed order of service. The estimated annual cost of printing the hymn sheets is currently between £500-£600 and this is rising. It is estimated that the new visual system will reduce regular printing costs by up to 94% and paper use by around 87%. The printed hymn sheet will not disappear completely:

- A limited number of copies of simplified hymn sheets will be produced for those who receive a recording of the service.
- These will be available to 'borrow' during the service for those who are unable to see the screens or have visual impairments.
- If you require a printed hymn sheet, please pick one up from the table in the vestibule and return it at the end of the service.
- The simplified hymn sheet will still be available to download on the website (livingstonechurch.org.uk) along with the intimations and church notices for those who listen to the service online at a later date.

Anything new will always experience teething problems and the new visual system has been no different. Over time, these difficulties will be resolved and any suggestions which could improve the new system are always welcomed — many have been implemented already! A number of 'volunteers' are currently being trained up to operate the system and the first batch of students have enjoyed the challenge and found it easier than they'd imagined. If you fancy a shot, why not come and have a go!

Finally, a great deal of thanks has to go to those who compiled the printed order of service over the past 18 years or so. Whether they had a long stint or simply covered absences, Dorothy Taylor, Maureen Smyth, Moira Lafferty, Sandra Palmer & Dorothy Hershaw did a great job

making sure we were singing the right words to the right hymns and ensured we weren't restricted to just one or two hymn books. The congregation of Livingstone has always been forward thinking and striving to progress. As the playwright George Bernard Shaw wrote, "Progress is impossible without change".


