## Editor's Letter



Welcome to the June edition of the magazine.

The old battered red case lay open on the floor. The chaotic pile of papers offered us real gems from long ago because it had lain in the loft unopened for many years. At the bottom was a letter addressed to my father-in-law dated 1941. It had been beautifully written in copperplate writing by his young wife informing him of the tragic death of her young brother who had passed away at the age of 11 due to polio. The pathos of the tragedy came across all too clearly to those who were reading it approximately 80 years on.

The case also contained many black and white photos, dog eared and yellowed by time. Some were of the Empire Exhibition of 1938 held in Bellahouston Park. (Old Ardeer employees will remember the rebuilt South African Exhibition building which was relocated locally.)

Other photos were of family members and signified important days in family life –four generations, first pram, first new suit, early days at school etc. Most were of grandparents, parents and relatives long passed away. But all were reminders of the characters and of important events, whenever we looked at them.

In contrast, nowadays, we still have many albums of early married days but they have been largely superseded by jpeg files in USB memory sticks and SD cards. The letters have been replaced by e-mails whose existence is but a memory in the ether.

Instagram, Facebook and WhatsApp have taken over. But they are just for the moment, difficult to conjure up memories from them!

## Minister's letter



Dear Friends,

By the time you're actually reading this letter, we'll have passed the first anniversary of my induction to the linked charge here. Maureen and I have been settling into the manse and finding our way around the area. It's a good time to reflect and a good time to look to the future. Things have changed over the last year but then they could never stay the same anyway.

I've made good contacts in Ardeer Primary School and Glencairn Primary School and there's been church services with both schools and monthly assemblies. At Ardeer, through the North Ayrshire Council Participatory Budgeting Event, we were awarded some money to develop a pilot Family Learning Project which will run after the school holidays. There'll be more detail on that later. We had a special visit to the Church from the Primary 3s at Glencairn Primary School and there are some examples of their work in the small hall.

I've seen my first Summer Mission here and I've seen how Ardeer, Livingstone and the High Kirk can work together focusing on children and young people. We've had a few 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday services through which we've done things differently: I know they don't suit everyone but for me, it's about our worship of God. We've had a couple of Messy Church which reached a good number of families. At Easter, we explored Holy Week and celebrated our Risen Christ at Stevenston Point at 7am on Easter Sunday with our friends from the High Kirk.

We've started out on the Path of Renewal with a focus on what it means to be a disciple of Jesus and the two Kirk Sessions have enjoyed joint

Session Conferences at the Communion weekends. We've had evening worship on the Communion Sunday, the last one being at Livingstone. These services have a focus on the ministry of Christian Healing.

At Livingstone, we celebrated with John Kerr on his 100<sup>th</sup> Birthday weekend and we admitted Alexander Chisholm as a new member. At Ardeer, we welcomed wee Kirk at his baptism. We held a Thinking/Founders Day service at Livingstone for the Scouts and Guides and presented President's Badges to 4 young men from the Boys Brigade at Ardeer.

I'm also very grateful and thankful to God for Brian Murray's placement with us. God has blessed us richly through Brian and I pray that He continues to do so.

We have to be aware, though, of certain things as we look to the future. The circumstances of the Church of Scotland are forever moving as the Church seeks its place in today's society. There is an ever declining number of people, members and those who minister, which also brings a decline in available funding. You'll maybe remember that I was inducted on a 7-year reviewable tenure and so that brings a particular focus.

Again, by the time you read this, the General Assembly will have been and gone but there will be things to consider and ponder as a result of the Assembly with implications for the church locally and nationally.

But more importantly than all these things, is our own relationship with the Father through His Son Jesus Christ and His Holy Spirit; as individuals, as congregations, as a linked charge and as the Church of Scotland in Stevenston. We must be able to connect with the Father to identify what it is He wants us to do in this place, what's His plan and provision for us here. Prayer and focusing on the Living Word are vital in the relationship with the Father and that's why we will develop prayer meetings in both congregations to pray for God's will for both congregations.

"Rejoice always, pray continually, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is God's will for you in Christ Jesus." 1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 NIV  
Our call to prayer is not just occasionally but continually.

From Matthew 6, verse 6 "But **when** you pray..." and verse 9 "This, then, is **how** you should pray..." (my emphasis added) Jesus expects us to pray and even shows us how to pray.

Prayer is necessary in the life of a Christian and as God's people in this place. We need to be praying both individually and together. Please, when prayer events are intimated, come to them, be part of it, for it's the only way we can find God's will for us.

## Prayer Thoughts



We very much stand at a time of great opportunity. Within the congregation a group has begun work on a stewardship initiative giving a focus to how our giving enables our Christian witness in Stevenston to be sustained. This will have at its core a gathering in October where the work of the church is on display and all members will receive an invitation to attend. As a congregation we have embarked on 'Path of Renewal'. A group from Ardeer and Livingstone have attended the first phase of a two year programme focussing on discipleship. We have been given an opportunity to read the Bible in a year with Sunday ministry based on the readings for the current week. A prayer group has begun at Ardeer with one at Livingstone to follow. Exciting, isn't it! This brings opportunity for all of us and with it the need for prayer.

Paul writes this in the first letter to Timothy who had worked along with him in his missionary journeys.

*'I urge, you first of all, to pray for all people. As you make your requests plead for God's mercy on them, and give thanks.'*

While it is important not to take things out of context, the sentiment expressed reminds us that as we work to improve the strength of our witness in the town we must not forget to pray for one another. Paul goes on to single out those who are rulers and people in authority, but our prayers must go further as we pray for one another. So let us prayerfully grasp our opportunity and build a people of real Christian power and influence.

## Themes

- Give thanks for those involved in the activities above and pray that more will become involved.

**Intercession:**

- Path for Renewal – pray that our journey will empower us in our discipleship in Stevenston.
- Stewardship Initiative – pray for those involved in organising and visiting.
- Pray for those members no longer able to join us in worship.
- Young People – pray for those in transition between schools or leaving school.

Summer Mission – pray for successful outreach to the town's young people.

### **Interview with Centenarian John Kerr**

1. Where were you born and where did you live as a child?

A. I was born and brought up at Bankend Farm, Kilwinning

2. Where and when were you baptised?

A. I was baptised in Livingstone Church in March 1918

3. Where did you go to school? Have you any significant memories of your school days?

A. I went to school in Kilwinning. I was the champion runner of the school. (I have even a medal to prove that). I spent my school summer holidays in Arran (Kilpatrick), every time the school stopped for the whole 2 months in the summer. I also spent Christmas and New Year holidays in Arran. This was with my cousin Archie Kerr who eventually was my best man.

4. Any memories from Sunday school days?

A. We went into Sunday School after we attended normal worship in the church. Juniors were in the wee hall and seniors in the large hall. We had examinations, and certificates were given out.

5. What was it like to be brought up during the Depression?

A. It did not affect us.

6. How and where did your father earn a living?

A. He was a dairy farmer at Bankend Farm. He did a milk round in Stevenston every morning (except Sunday)

7. Can you remember any of your favourite toys?

A. I had an old wheel barrow that I used to push around the farm yard. It only had the wheel and the handles.

8. At what age did you start working and where?

A. I started working at 14 on my father's farm.

9. Where were you married and did you have a wedding reception?

A. I was married in Livingstone Church with the reception in Livingstone Church hall.

Archie Kerr was my best man and Helen Pirie was Elsie's bridesmaid.

10. What did you do during the war?

A. I was in the Home Guard as a driver.

11. Any memories of being part of the church choir?

A. We performed the Messiah once or twice. We had a great organist and Choir Master in Bill Archibald, and Mr Townsley before him.

12. Any changes to the church building that you can remember?

A. No, not really. It remains much the same.

13. What's your recipe for a long and happy life?

A. Behave yourself. Keep above board. Don't drink.

14. And what about smoking then, you used to smoke?

A. I smoked for a while. Isa Scott, who also was a smoker at one time, persuaded me (and others) to stop smoking.

15. Anything else you want to share?

A. I tried to get a week's holiday each year. I always went to Butlin's. These were great holidays.

## April joint service

Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> April, being the 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday in the month, was a joint service and as with previous 5<sup>th</sup> Sunday services was a service with a difference. The start and close of the service were fairly traditional with the usual hymns and prayers and at the end of the service we had lunch together in the hall. Thanks to Livingstone for an excellent lunch. It was great to be able to sit and chat with people rather than rush off home and most people were able to stay so the hall was full and there was a lively buzz.



The focus of the service was prayer and in particular the Lord's Prayer. The reading was from Matthew Chapter 5 verses 5 – 15 where Jesus taught his disciples about prayer. The minister spoke briefly about the passage then we moved round 6 bases, each base looking at one aspect of prayer. The bases were both practical and thought provoking and gave you the opportunity to think personally about the Lord's Prayer.

Base 1– This base was about **God's character** and the fact that we are precious to God. We were asked to take a piece of the jigsaw and pray quietly to ourselves to see what God wants us to do. A jigsaw isn't complete until all the pieces are in place and God wants all of us in His Kingdom or it won't be complete.



Base 2 – This base was about **God's Kingdom**. At this base there was a map of the 3 towns and we were asked to pray for someone, something, somewhere in the 3 Towns, our local area. We have a responsibility to pray for those around us and there are plenty of people in need close to us. How can we bring God's Kingdom to Stevenston?



Base 3 – This base was about **God's Provision**. There were sweets and food on the table. We

were asked to take time to say thanks for all that God gives us, not just food but everything He gives us. Then we could have something to eat. The children really liked this base!!!

Base 4 – This base was about **God's Forgiveness**. There was a bowl of water and some paper and pens. We were asked to write on the paper either someone we wanted to forgive or some of our own sins. When then put the paper into the water and asked for God to take away our sins and to help us to forgive others. Rather than just thinking in general about 'forgive us our sins' it was an opportunity to stop and think about particular areas we need to work on personally.



Base 5 – This base was about **God's Guidance**. We were asked to take a verse and think about it and to ask God to reveal the purpose He has for us knowing that He will support and guide us in all we do for Him.

Base 6 – This base was about **God's Protection**. We were asked to seek God's protection for either ourselves or others by writing their name down and hanging it on the prayer tree. There were also scrabble tiles which we could use instead.

We all say the Lord's Prayer regularly but we don't always stop to think what it really means. What is God trying to say? We say it out of habit. We say it by rote.

This was a good opportunity to stop and think more deeply about prayer, about ourselves and what it is God wants us to do. I'm sure different people took something different away from each activity, and that's the way it should be.

What did I take away from the service? I felt that the bases helped me in what had been a difficult week to stop and think, more deeply than I usually do, about what God wants for me and about the areas of my life I need to work on. It also gave me the chance to be thankful for everything He does for me and to ask Him to take care of all those I know, and those I don't know, who need His comfort and His love today.

Finally a quick question for you - and it's a true story. **Why is there a horse in the Lord's Prayer?** This was the question my mother, aged 7, asked her mum one Sunday after church. My gran said there wasn't a horse in the Lord's prayer but my mum insisted and quoted the exact words;

'Forgive us our debts as we forgive our dead horse!!'

My gran patiently told her what the right word was and then went on to explain what it meant. During our bases we had the chance to explore what the Lord's Prayer has to say to us.

### **Fabric Report**



**Boilers:** Work is still on going about the heating. The boilers have had their annual service. There are some small parts that need to be replaced. Otherwise all is well.

**Hall Windows:** This job is now finished. The windows have been scraped, sanded down, washed and painted.

**Bell Tower toilet:** The paint in the disabled toilet in the bell tower is flaking badly. We have started to scrape it off and will lightly sand the walls. The walls will be coated with PVA glue and finally painted with a silk or matt finish.

**Lock:** The counting house lock has now been replaced. It was found that the door is catching the carpet. This is to be planed down soon.

**Loose plaster:** A Church of Scotland surveyor has examined the premises. He has found that there are a number of loose slates in both church and halls that may be letting in water therefore damaging the plasterwork.

**Fire Extinguishers:** They were inspected by the engineer and found to be in order apart from the two powder ones which were out of date. They have been replaced.

**Future Projects:** There are some loose floor boards in the church on the left (school side) of the pulpit. This needs to be investigated.

There are small patches of flaking paint on the walls leading to the gallery. We will put this on the list to be dealt with.

## Presbytery Report



The Presbytery welcomed members of the Guild Presbyterial Council. The council's annual report was delivered by Moira Buchanan, who gave a brief summary of the projects the Guild is involved with.

This is the third and final year of their Be Bold Be Strong initiative. After 'Go in Peace' and 'Go in Joy' this year's theme was 'Go in Love.' She highlighted the six main projects the Guild is supporting, Street Pastors, Care for the Family initiative Let's Stick Together and Prospect's All Friends Together and the overseas projects Christian Aid in Bolivia, Haiti Relief and initiatives involving FGM and its effect on girls. As of January £570000 had been raised for these projects.

2018 is the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the ordination of woman in the Church of Scotland. To mark this Rev Elizabeth Watson (Lamlash), ordained 37 years ago, gave an account of her experiences as a candidate and as



one of the first woman Ministers. While delivered with her usual humour, some of the events and attitudes described showed little Christian empathy. Tanya Webster (Park) recounted her experiences entering the Ministry 30 years later. Fortunately these were free of the bias of the earlier period.

Report from Presbytery Planning Conference was given which presented a pretty pessimistic view of the Church's financial position over the next 5 years. There was indication that 121 would look sympathetically on Churches trying to change their premises or selling them in order to relocate. A view was expressed from the floor that it looked as though the finances were being allowed to direct the Church's mission rather than the other way round and that these misgivings should be passed on to the General Assembly. As it was decided that there was too little time before this year's Assembly, we would wait to see what the report when presented to Assembly actually said before commenting further.

The Brodick manse will have to be demolished and rebuilt as it is in an unfit state for habitation. For a house that is only 22 years old something has been done very badly.

Dorothy Grainger's demission was passed and a letter of thanks from Dorothy was read to Presbytery.

Lamlash were granted £750 Ministry and Mission reduction for Path of Renewal and Cumbrae £9000 due to unforeseen expense in their Church build.

## **Church and Society**

We are considering ways of collating issues that concern members so that a more coordinated response can be made to Councils, Scottish and National Government. Members can be made aware of these small issues, which individually do not make headlines but collectively can highlight problems e.g. elderly people having to cope with online services, lack of banking facilities etc.

Kilwinning Old are running a bus to Heart and Soul during Assembly week anyone interested should contact Isobel Beck.

Message in a Bottle is being promoted by the Rotary and would like local Churches to advertise their campaign.

You will note that the cash balance at the end of the month is now less than our average monthly expenditure. It has dropped from £5991 in

January. While we may have sufficient income in April to cover our expenses and we are due dividends in May I think the margin of uncertainty is too great. The Session has decided to withdraw up to £5000 from our reserves to act as a cash buffer to prevent our cash account becoming overdrawn. This is the first time in my ten years plus as treasurer that I have had to withdraw reserves to cover normal expenses.

Remember if you pay tax at all then the Church can claim Gift Aid on your donations. If for whatever reason you find the Free Will Offering envelopes inconvenient, offerings can be made through a standing order. The form for this can be obtained from the team in the vestibule after each Service.
