Editor's Letter

Welcome to the June 2020 edition of Faith and Fellowship. As I write this, there is cautious discussion of easing lockdown. Schools may get to return before the summer holidays kick in and limited interactions between households is being allowed. Only time will tell whether this easing will continue or have to be reversed.

Like many, lockdown has impacted upon my work life with some aspects being moved online while others have to be put on hold. I'm looking forward to going in to work at some point in the future when it is deemed safe to do so. When it comes to socialising, my friends and I simply increased our usage of pre-existing means of communication like WhatsApp and Discord. In fact, I think my social life has been busier than before with more regular communication with friends overseas and reconnecting with others. It's been really nice. The most difficult aspect has been my parents. Both are part of shielded groups and I don't enjoy being the meanie that makes them stay at home. However there has been the occasional shopping trip when they strictly get to stay in the car, so sometimes they get the carrot instead of the stick.

The church has also had to undergo quite a few changes to meet the challenges of lockdown. Before Covid, there had been some discussion around the idea of a Union without buildings. At the time, it was thought there would be months if not years to prepare and plan for it but clearly things haven't quite worked out that way. Lockdown has refocused the church onto digitising many of its services and functions. The Sunday Service is always available online on the church website where I'm sure you also found this online exclusive edition of the magazine. There have been regular Coffee Mornings every Wednesday held on Zoom, dubbed 'Coffee & Company', where church members get together to chat and share a little worship. I would positively encourage anyone to join us, it's really nice getting to see other church members and I certainly get to see more people than I used to on a Sunday. If you are interested, please contact the Minister on how to join.

One issue which has arisen has been that of communications. Particularly with those without a presence online. Part of a solution to this is discussed later by Ross in a short article. Another difficulty the

churches have faced has been that of finance. Donations received are down considerably and something will need to be done. As the church increases its online profile, I believe that there is opportunity to search for novel ways to raise funds. We could set-up a church PayPal account to accept donations on the church website. A Patreon account would allow regular donations to be made online, although use of this platform may require careful consideration. Maybe we could have our own merchandise for sale on an online store.

If we are going to have a non-traditional church, we are going to need some non-traditional ways of funding it. It won't be possible for the church to carry on as it did before. This crisis has forced us to change our methodology and we should make full use of this chance to implement some long overdue reform. As a young person, I don't just want the church to survive but to thrive! Without change, it won't.

On a brighter note, one of the first things to do before a Union is to decide upon a name. What are your thoughts? Send in your suggestions to the magazine for the next issue!

To illustrate the effect of the lockdown, compare February to April. Neither of these months had any exceptional items.

Income:	February	£2800	April	£1028
Expenses	February	£3842	April	£3762

Expenses are about the same our income has dropped by over 50%. Even before lockdown collections were not meeting costs and while Gift Aid and dividends made up most of this, we had no reserves for Mission or any type of outreach. Dividends are likely to be at least 50% reduced for the next year which further exacerbates our difficulties. Our main difficulty is contacting members who are not comfortable with using the internet for finances. Several members have set up standing orders in the past months, a few have sent me cheques (made out to the Church!) which I have deposited, so if you have been putting your Free Will Envelopes aside perhaps you might consider consolidating them into a cheque made out to Stevenston, Livingstone Church and post them to me.

I have taken £15000 out of our reserves to help cover the immediate shortfall but that will only keep us viable for a few months. If we wish to have any financial resources left, we need to take action very quickly.

When you shop at smile.amazon.co.uk, you'll find the exact same prices and selections as amazon.co.uk, with the added bonus that Amazon will donate a portion of the purchase price to your selected charity.

How do I select a charitable organisation to support when shopping on AmazonSmile?

On your first visit to smile.amazon.co.uk you need to select a charitable organisation to receive donations from eligible purchases before you begin shopping. You will need to search for **Stevenston Livingstone**

Parish Church of Scotland and press 'Select'. Simply searching for 'Stevenston' should bring it up. Then every eligible purchase you make at smile.amazon.co.uk will result in a donation.

It is important to note that Amazon will only donate to the Church if you purchase via smile.amazon.co.uk. It will not work if you go directly to amazon.co.uk. Your usual Amazon account and log in details will work on smile.amazon.co.uk. It is not currently possible to use AmazonSmile on the Amazon app if you have an Apple device (iPhone/iPad). You will need to use a web browser to go to the AmazonSmile website. It is possible to set up AmazonSmile on the app if you use an Android device.

Twilio

Many years ago, our Sunday services were available on cassette tape for those who were unable to attend Church. In recent years, CDs have been available and since 2015, recordings of the service have been on the Livingstone Church website for people to listen to at a time of their choosing.

During this lockdown period however, it has become apparent that some people are unable to access the Sunday service. Not everyone has access to the internet and it would be challenging to increase the existing CD delivery system at a time when travel is limited, social distancing is in place and the risks surrounding coronavirus still remain high.

We now have the solution to this – Twilio. Every week, the Sunday service will be available to listen to by phone. All you have to do is call **(01294) 444370** and press number 1 on your telephone keypad when prompted. There will be a short wait while it connects to the service – this may take up to 1 minute during which the line will go quiet.





It costs the same normal local call and these prices vary depending on your telephone provider. If you have an inclusive calls package, it will be included in this and will not cost any extra.

Communications from Abroad

In the last week or so, I've had some email discussion with a John Thompson, who is in Izmir, Turkey, and has family connections with Ardeer Church. Here's some excerpts from a letter he sent. If anyone has information that they can share with him, I'm more than happy to give you his email address. Dave

"During this time of uncertainty and lockdown I have been again shaking the branches of my family tree to see if I could discover more information. On my grandfather Robert Hamilton's side the Hamilton and Hunter families I can trace them as far as the early 1800s as being resident in Stevenston.

My maternal grandmother Mary Gibson's family of McComb and Gibson were also long established in Stevenston. The McComb's at Townhead Street and the Gibson's later at Chemical Row, Ardeer. It is from these people that I have my Christian heritage. My grandmother later to be Labour Councillor for Kilwinning Landward

taught me the hymns and Bible stories from an early age so that my parents were a bit taken aback when I asked for a Bible for Christmas 1966 when I was not yet 6 years of age.

So the McCombs and the Gibsons had associations with Ardeer Parish Church even before it was Ardeer Parish Church! I find a Robert McComb on the first kirk session of 1895 who is my great, great grandfather. Ardeer Church opened with ceremony on the 14th June 1895 only a few months tragedy clouded the McComb and extended family with the Auchenharvie mining disaster on 2nd August 1895. McComb father and two sons were able to escape but others were not so fortunate.

The Gibsons had associations with Ardeer my great auntie Annie Paterson was still in the Guild into the 1960s and 70s having been born in Ardeer in 1898. My great grandfather William Gibson and his wife Annie McComb raised a family of ten at 13 Chemical Row, Ardeer.

My godmother May McKenzie with her parents Willie and Grace McKenzie were lifetime members. I can trace 'Auntie' May from the youth fellowship, Sunday school and through to the eldership – the duties of which she took faithfully and responsibly until no longer able to do so. It was always a treat to visit Auntie May and she would have a gift for us kids – a pencil a colouring book a scripture text."

A Year On

It's exactly a year since I passed over the editorship of the Livingstone Herald to Alan. At the end of June 2018, I prepared the kirk session by telling them that I would continue as editor for one final year. I felt I had been doing it long enough. New ideas were slow to materialise and the magazine seemed to me to be very set in its ways. Yet I was concerned that perhaps no one would be prepared to take it on and that after 20 years the magazine would just peter out.

When Alan contacted me and agreed to meet up with me to discuss editing the magazine I wondered if he realised what a commitment he would be making. He was young, enthusiastic and asking all the right questions. I was also pleased that at the beginning he wanted to keep the framework as it was. What I have enjoyed is the way he has

changed the Herald. Little by little he has put his own stamp on it. He has tried some thought provoking articles and he has had a very good response from the congregation.

In the September 2019 magazine, Alan tried 'Views from the pews' focusing on how churches have changed and what the church of the future might look like. A good

number of contributors had a go at trying to answer this. The Christmas edition was expanded to include Ardeer's news and the magazine was produced in colour to mark the launch of the joint venture with a new title of 'Faith and Fellowship'.

In the last edition the theme was centred around prayer. Andrew Tomlinson had produced a Framework for prayer as a support to praying. Once again there were a variety of very interesting articles as several members attempted to explain what praying means to them.

Because I don't produce the magazine any longer, I planned to take some extra holidays and get away for a few days during the months when in the past I would be planning and editing the magazine. Unfortunately thanks to the current lock down, holidays have been curtailed for all, this year. I have enjoyed spending the extra time in the garden however and our garden is looking better than it has in years.





Thank you, Alan, for taking up the challenge. You have embraced it wholeheartedly and I look forward to enjoying more interesting and contentious articles in the future.


